
Fictions and Facts about St. Andrew's

FICTION: St. Andrew's is wealthy.

FACT: Many churches our size and with our history have substantial endowments that fund one-third, one-half, or more of their annual operating budgets and provide for the maintenance and care of their buildings. St. Andrew's has a very small endowment. At the end of 2022, our total investment portfolio was valued at just over \$1.2 million. Our annual draw on the endowment accounts for just 6% of our operating budget. We are introducing a Planned Giving program to help bolster our endowment, but that work will take time to come to fruition.

Looking at this in a different way, of course St. Andrew's *is* wealthy. We are in an affluent community in an affluent country. Together, we have what it takes to build a ministry equal to the task God sets before us.

Please know: The wardens, vestry, rector, and staff are grateful for <u>every</u> pledge of support, no matter the size. And, if your financial situation is such that you cannot pledge this year, please know that we are grateful that you are here, grateful for the many ways you support St. Andrew's, and grateful for your prayers.

St. Andrew's was founded as a mission church in 1827. In the early years we worshipped in parishioner's homes before building a wooden church seating about 300 people on the north end of our property in 1836.

In 1868, just three years after the Civil War, the cornerstone for our current sanctuary was laid. The building was funded by our faithful parishioners at the time, who pledged some \$30,000 to complete the project. The rector, the Rev. George Gillespie, said they built this church "for ourselves" and

"for our children" as a sign that St. Andrew's is here "for all ages, for all sorts and conditions of people, without any difference or inequality."

For one hundred and fifty years, St. Andrew's has worshipped in this building, expanding it as our needs shifted. This building is a gift from those who have come before us; a gift for us to enjoy and use for worship, mission, and ministry; a gift for us to care for and leave for future generations.

RISE TO THE CHALLENGE

Our Annual Giving Campaign is well underway!

113 families have committed \$607,490 representing a 27.3% increase in their giving over 2023.

We hope you will Rise to the Challenge as these families have and do your best to support our mission and ministry in the year ahead.

Behind the Scenes of Building & Grounds

Much of the work done under the mantle of 'Building & Grounds' goes unnoticed! If you didn't notice the leaking in-ground sprinkler system or the fire alarm going off due to a faulty sensor, it's because our staff and volunteers worked to identify and resolve the issue quickly and with as little disruption as possible.

A few of our unexpected and planned projects this past year:

- The large conifer in front of the cloister was uprooted by heavy snow in early March
- A branch from a neighboring tree caused minor damage when it landed on the roof of the kitchen
- New wall paneling was installed in the back hall of the kitchen after last year's water abatement work
- Our volunteer gardeners worked continually to remove the fast-growing, invasive Virginia Creeper which can be damaging to the building's mortar if left alone
- S After a lengthy supply chain delay, our new granite sign was installed on the front lawn

Historic St. Andrew's

These efforts are led by Matt Marsh, our sexton since 2006, who mows the lawn during the warmer months, salts and plows the sidewalk at all hours of the day during winter, and keeps everything in good working order. Jeff Sharp, our housekeeper since 2021, works to keep our 40,000 ft² building clean, opens and closes the facility, and prepares spaces for events.

WELCOME TO SAINT ANDREW'S

Whoever you are and wherever you find yourself on the journey of faith, you are welcome here.

If you have a hearing aid equipped with telecoil capability, please note that the church sanctuary has been equipped with this technology.

Please wear a name tag! If you do not have a name tag, please make one using the cards and the plastic sleeves provided in the Narthex. Don't forget to file your name tag after wearing it in the appropriate box with the first initial of your last name. Forgot yours at home? Single use name tags are available.

THE EUCHARIST

The celebration of the Holy Eucharist is an act of joy and praise, which draws its principal meaning from the Easter proclamation of the resurrection. All who are drawn to God and seek Christ are welcome to receive communion.

Please come forward and stand or kneel at the rail. The priest will place the bread in your outstretched palm (Consecrated rice wafers are available for those with wheat allergies - simply ask the priest). You may dip (intinct) the wafer in the wine in the small cup held by the Eucharistic minister. Alternatively, you may indicate your desire to drink from the common chalice by consuming the bread and remaining at the rail after the Eucharistic minister passes;



Ushers will receive your offering during the Offertory or you can give online via WeShare at: standrewsaa.weshareonline.org another Eucharistic minister will bring the large chalice over for you to drink from directly.

Please know that Christ is fully present in both the bread and the wine - there is no requirement to receive both. If you do not wish to receive communion, you may come forward, cross your hands over your chest, and receive a blessing.

Children and youth in preschool through high school attend Church School from 9:45 am until they join their families during the Children's Entrance Hymn. Preschoolers need to be picked up by a parent.



MUSIC NOTES

Hymn 680: O God, our help in ages past

This hymn is based on today's Psalm, 90; it extols God's greatness and faithfulness and funnels that grandeur to the level of personal trust in the protection of God. This hymn moves seamlessly from "a thousand ages" of God's perspective to the whisk of "an evening gone" in our own lives. The tune "St. Anne" first appeared in a psalm-book in 1708, and has many similarities with music by Bach and Handel. It was paired with this text in 1861, a match so perfect we can hardly imagine one without the other. Together they make a grand expression of abiding trust. -- Donna Wessel Walker

This morning's anthem by Mark Sirett (b. 1952), former Organist and Director of Music at St. George's Cathedral in Kingston, Ontario, was originally composed for a wedding. It sets the well-known text from 1 John 4:7-12 to beautiful, lyrical part-writing and a flowing accompaniment that together depict God's love for us as the reason and cause for our striving to love one another. -- Dennis Powers
