The **Melbourne Chamber Choir**, founded by Faye Dumont more than 30 years ago, continues to be a leading contributor to the Melbourne choral scene. It is a small fourpart choir (SATB) that performs works from across the musical ages, from Medieval to contemporary times and in many languages. In addition, a charter of the choir is to showcase new Australian works.

In the Choir's distinguished history it has performed with the Melbourne and Sydney Symphony Orchestras, Orchestra Victoria, the Melbourne Chamber Orchestra, and the percussion ensemble Synergy. It has shared concerts with the Blessed Sacrament Basilica of Christchurch, New Zealand, the North Arizona University Choir and the Corinthian Singers of Adelaide. It provided the southern continent choral music for the Opening of the Beijing Olympics.

2013 marks a significant new phase in our history with the arrival of a new Music Director, **Dr. David Kram**. David comes to the choir with many years of international conducting experience. He is also an educator, pianist, music arranger and composer, and Senior Fellow of the University of Melbourne.

This year the Melbourne Chamber Choir has already held two much acclaimed concerts. In December the choir will join in the Season of Light and of Freedom, as part of Chanukah, at Temple Beth Israel in St. Kilda, singing Händel's 'Judas Maccabeus'.

After initial studies at The University of Melbourne, **Anthony Halliday** was awarded Fellowships to study at The Royal College of Music London and the University of London. He received many awards and prizes and has given numerous piano and organ recitals and concerto performances throughout Europe and Australasia.

Anthony has given many recitals in the German Lutheran Trinity Church, notably the eight-part series "Beethoven and Friends" in 2007/08, each part beginning with preludes and fugues of the Well Tempered Clavier by J.S. Bach. In 2010 a CD "Lobe den Herren" was released with Anthony playing German sacred music on the heritage listed organ (1874).



Program Notes:

'A Mighty Fortress Is Our God' is one of the best known and best loved of Martin Luther's hymns. Luther wrote the words and composed the melody sometime between 1527 and 1529. It has been called the 'Battle Hymn of the Reformation' for the effect it had in increasing support for the Reformer's cause, initiated ten years earlier. **J.S. Bach** composed the church cantata 'Ein feste Burg ist unser Gott' BWV 80 for Reformation Day 31 October, first performed between 1727 and 1731.

The '*Missa brevis in F major*' (Lutheran Mass) BWV 233 refers to one of **J.S. Bach's** four short masses. Each Missa, composed around 1738/39, is in six movements of Kyrie and Gloria. Some in revised form became part of the famous 'Mass in B-minor' BWV 232.

'Elegischer Gesang' (Elegian song) op. 118 is a work by **L. van Beethoven** which is scored for string quartet and four voices. The work furthers his late infatuation with the genre of string quartet. It is one of Beethoven's least known works and is not performed very often.

J. Brahms' op. 29 '*Schaffe in mir Gott ein rein Herz*' seems based on the wellknown 'Singet dem Herrn ein neues Lied' by J.S. Bach. Brahms applied some contrapuntal skill to the expressive power; the obvious fugue bristling with powerful effect, easily mistaken for simple Romantic pastoralism.

Heimat is a German concept, a word with no English equivalent. It usually carries positive connotations. The nearest English term would be home or homeland, the place where one knows itself best. It is where one belongs, a space one longs to be (Alexandra Ludewig, Perth).
